CHAPTER V

CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTIONS

In this chapter, the writer presents some conclusions and suggestions dealing with the research.

5.1 Conclusions

Based on the analysis and finding of comparative on imperative sentences it can be concluded that the types of imperative sentences in English and *Uab Meto* can be positive imperative sentences and negative sentences. TheImperative sentence in English has six functions such as command, request, invitation, suggestion, advice, and prohibition. Meanwhile, *Uab Meto* has seven functions such as command, request, invitation, suggestion, advice, prohibition, and warning.

The imperative sentence in English and *Uab Meto* has similarities in positive of basic sentence patterns: S + V; S + V + O + C; V + O, and V + O + C.

In the negative form of basic sentence pattern in *Uab Meto* is Don't + S + V, but in English is Don't + V and in *Uab Meto*Don' + S + V + O, meanwhile in English Don't +V + O.

For Example:

The second person singular '2Sg' in *Uab Meto* has difference in the second person plural '2P1'. It is *Ho* for 2Sg and *Hi* for 2P1. Meanwhile, in English 2Sg and 2P1are the same it is <u>You</u>. So it can be concluded that imperative sentences in two languages are not the same because each language has its own characteristics.

5.2 Suggestions

Based on the conclusion it can be suggest to the teachers, the students and other researcher as follow:

- 1. The writer hopes that her research can be used to expound the reader's knowledge of local language
- 2. Hopefully, for central government in language documentation build up good cooperation with the local government and the native spiker of *UabMeto* to create linguistic books in order to make the people there easily in getting any information that is germane with ethnolinguistics.
- 3. Other researcher who will conduct a similar study can use this paper as literature. Besides that, they can develop the study in another type of sentence or another language.
