CHAPTER V

CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTIONS

5.1 Conclusion

Contextually, the use of clothes and jewelries as signs in performance of Ledo Hawu in Tao Leo as one of funeral ceremonies which belongs to those who follow Jingitiu belief as the ancestral religion of Sabunese shares a number of unique meanings, they are (1) Hig'i pudi (smooth white blanket) means honesty and holiness/purity life of dead in the presence of his/her Almighty God (Deo Ama); (2) Lehu kattu (head band) means the appreciation of the gift that was given by Miha Ngara as one of the ancestors of Sabunese and all at once as the descent commemoration of Sabunese; (3) Labba (silver/gold cross crown) means honoring on the merits and the struggle of the earlier dead kings of Sabunese; (4) Wudu (traditional necklace) means rich treasures of the earlier ancestors including the families of the dead; (5) Teru'u (ring) means rich treasures of dead; (6) Hemala (sword) means knight of men to expel every evil spirits during the way of the dead till the world of ancestors; (7) Wonagiri (feet bells) as the tools of entertainment for members of the dead and all at once as the accompanist for the dead on his/her way to the world of the earlier ancestors; (8) 'Ai (sarong) means self-protection and identity of female dead for the earlier ancestors; (9) Paddi (silver/gold belt) means bundle of Hubi Ae and Hubi Iki descents between the dead and the alive person.

5.2 Suggestions

In the line with the conclusions stated above, the writer would like to provide some suggestions as in the followings:

- It is suggested for other researchers to conduct any kind of research with related topics.
- 2. Practically, the use of clothes and jewelries in the performance of *Ledo Hawu* mostly refer to histories of the earlier ancestors' experiences in the past. Due to the lack of written documents dealing with *Ledo Hawu* in *Tao Leo* ceremony, the attention of government and every chief of custom in the Island of Sabu are very expected to document every history of earlier ancestors' experience with a view to conserve and handed down from generation to generation.
